This Month's Demo is...

Creating Christmas Ornaments By Brian Evans

Brian Evans has been turning wood for approximately twenty years. He first read Richard Raffan's book and learned through the process of trial and error. Eventually, he took classes from expert wood turners such as Jean Francois Escoulen, Michael Hosaluk, Stuart Batty, Phil Brennion, Betty Scarpino, George Hatfield, and Nick Cook. Brain is a past officer of the Dallas Area Woodturners club and he is currently their turning coordinator.

Brian will give us a demonstration on making Christmas ornaments. He will show how to make a hollow body ornament with a finial. Since ornaments are small, often they can be made from scrap pieces of wood that were left over from other projects. They make beautiful gifts and the process of making them improves a person's turning skills.
