This Month's Demo is...

"Turning Duplicates" PRESENTED BY JOHN HORN

Sooner or later we all are asked to make one or more duplicates of a turning on the lathe. With a minimum of experience, turning the first piece is not usually a problem. The difficulties begin with making the following pieces look exactly like the original.

John Horn's program will demonstrate several techniques to ensure that an item can be closely duplicated. He will also show how to avoid some of the more common mistakes that are made when trying to copy a pattern and how to minimize errors that often plague turners when turning multiple copies. To illustrate these duplication techniques, John will turn a furniture spindle and also a chess game piece as two practical and challenging applications. Most of the traditional chess sets are lathe turned with some carving on the knights and other details on some of the major pieces. Turning the pieces of your own chess set is an accomplishment that a number of woodturners would like to enjoy but keep putting it off because of the perceived difficulty of making a number of small duplicate pieces. By learning duplication techniques, a little carving and making a few jigs, the task can be accomplished to most people's satisfaction. If there is a problem, just remember it is just a piece of wood and there is more wood where that piece came from.

John has been conducting demonstrations several times a year at monthly chapter meetings for woodturning clubs in Texas and Oklahoma. Also, John has demonstrated turning techniques almost every year since 1998 at



SWAT (Texas Turn-or-Two). John's versatility is legendary -- but since it is rumored that he is the "real" Santa Claus, these things are no hill for a stepper. He keeps his audience on the edge of their seats and has even been known to sneak in a bit of turning humor now and then. The list of programs that he has performed at SWAT/TTT is long and includes designing and turning the following projects: birdhouse Christmas ornament, Santa Claus nutcracker, threaded lidded box, peppermill, jewelry, and my favorite "Taming the Skew". Before John's program on the skew, I figured that, at best, it might have served as an ancient Celtic weapon or in modern times as a tool for opening paint cans. In his prior life, John was an educator specializing in high school band and choir. He currently teaches woodturning classes at Woodcraft in Addison and individual sessions in his shop. In his spare time, he stays busy doing production turning for both businesses and individuals.

This is a serious hobby for me and I have even sold a few pens, but my day job is as a pediatrician in north Carrollton. I have been in practice here since 1982 and am now seeing the children of patients I saw as children. As a busy physician, being out in my shop, working on the lathe, well, it allows me to relax and forget my day and fully concentrate on the bowl on my lathe. As we all know, if we are not fully concentrating, pieces will fly.
















President's Patter



If you have not attended one of these symposiums, this is a great chance to see some outstanding demonstrations. There will be National and Regional demonstrators attending. Watching these demonstrators turn is a very educational experience. The demonstrations are 90 minutes long. There will be two demonstrations Friday, four on Saturday, and three on Sunday. So you have a total of nine demonstrations you can select to attend. In addition, one of the best parts of the symposium is the Instant Gallery. Members attending bring items they have turned for all

to see. These are some of the best woodturnings you will ever see. Don't miss the Instant Gallery. Also, there will be many vendors at the symposium all wanting to give you the "best deals" on items such as, crushed stone, turning tools, all species of wood, and many other items having to do with our craft. On Saturday night there will be a banquet and auction. At the auction you will have a chance to bid on some outstanding turned pieces. 
Don't let the BOM club carry GTW's contribution to this worthwhile charity. All members need to participate and keep turning bowls. They are counting on our support again this year.

Articles of Interest

My wife, Pat, and I took a two week vacation in Oregon and Washington this month. Along with seeing some very beautiful country I was able to buy some really nice pieces of Myrtle and Northern Big Leaf Maple burls and figured wood. I found two places heading south on U.S. 101. The first was in Reedsport, Oregon at the Myrtlewood Gallery. This place had some beautiful turnings and carvings. Most of the turnings were done on site on a Oneway lathe. The back rooms were my primary interest and they were full of maple blocks and burls. They were a little pricey but Sharon Mast, the owner, did give me a discount for multiple pieces which is still much less expensive than you can buy online and have it shipped. I was so intent on getting some turning wood that I forgot to take photos. These are from Google Earth.





The second place, and the one to get Myrtle, is a few miles further south at Bandon, Oregon. The business is called American Western Exotic Hardwoods and is located on U.S. 101 six miles south of Bandon. The owner, David Leister, buys logs from the local mills and burls from wherever he can get them. He saws the logs on his own mill saw and makes some into table tops and sells slabs, blocks and burls. As you can tell by the photo this is NOT a gallery but is a place to get some good deals on local woods. David does not have a web site.
