"STONE & MINERAL INLAY TECHNIQUES" PRESENTED BY STEVE HATCHER

This Month's Demo is...

We are again fortunate to have Stephen Hatcher for our October demonstration. As some of you recall, Stephen was in town last February and we had a special meeting featuring his demonstration.

If you missed his last demo, you have a second opportunity to see him. If you saw his first demo, you will have an opportunity to learn more from Stephen. Stephen will first show and discuss a wide range of inlaid woodturnings using a power-point presentation. He will then inlay a small platter with an accent rim. This will demonstrate all the basic steps in completing an inlay. He will then add detailed imagery to the center of the platter. We will see the proper use of a Dremel tool and associated burrs plus accessories to carve an inlay.

Stephen Hatcher was born in Colorado Springs, Colorado in 1953. He showed an early aptitude for realistic drawing, and after finishing high school earned income as a painter of murals. Though art has been a lifetime interest, several years at the University of Washington led to degrees in Electrical Engineering and Mathematics. During his 20-year career as an electronics entrepreneur, Stephen developed numerous cutting-edge devices for the wireless communications industry. Retiring from this field in 2000, he returned to art through his interests in wood turning and stone carving. Merging these techniques led to his unique style of artwork.

Don Hawkins was born in Wichita Falls Texas in 1940 and moved to Acme Texas when he was 2. Don lived there and in Quanah until he went to what was then Texas Tech University in Lubbock and received a degree in industrial management. After college, Don worked for then Texas Power and Light as an industrial consultant for 5 Years. He met his wife Dixie in Plano in 1968 and married that year. They have three children, two girls and a boy, and five grand children. He and Dixie moved to Gainesville in 1972 and went into real estate sales in 1973. They ran their own brokerage office for 36 years. They sold their real estate company three years ago and now concentrate on traveling, golf, wood turning and fishing.



Don was introduced to wood turning by a customer about 10 years ago and found it one of the most enjoyable and relaxing things he has ever done. Don enjoys teaching others "what little I know" he says and as we have all experienced, loves to talk about wood turning and showing off. Don enjoys the friendships he has made in the club and looks forward to many more years of making shavings.

Oak Street in Denton. Handcrafted clay ware and wooden bowls donated by local and regional fine artists, student artists, and the Golden Triangle Woodturners, as well as bowls designed by church members throughout the year, are offered at the luncheon. All proceeds are donated to Our Daily Bread soup kitchen and the Denton Community Food Center.



The Beads of Courage program is a resilience-based intervention designed to support and strengthen the protective resources in children coping with serious illness. Through the program children tell their story using colorful beads as meaningful symbols of courage that commemorate milestones they have achieved along their unique treatment path.
