# This Month's Demo is... "Turning A Vessel In A Box

I became a member of North Texas Woodturners in 1992. And in 1993 I attended the second annual Texas Turn or Two gathering (now known as SWAT) in Columbus, TX. I brought home lots of knowledge and ideas from there. But, my best inspiration was Larry



Roberts; he taught me and many others in NTW -- even people from West Texas. Now, I am a member of the Dallas Area Woodturners club.

Over the years I have attended woodturning classes at Arrowmont in Gatlinburg, TN as a student and as a teacher's assistant. Closer to home, four years ago, I became an art student at Collin College to study other types of art media. Now, I enjoy mixing other media with woodturnings and making large sculptures. During this time, some of my college classmates became interested in woodturning, so I now run the woodturning lab and teach them part time.

My demonstration will show how to turn a ball inside a box. This was described in "Woodturning," a magazine from the UK several years ago. This requires one homemade tool and a homemade wood chuck jaw along with a little patience.







#### President's Patter

This is the time of year that we Americans traditionally think about our many blessings. Most of us are pretty lucky in that we have sufficient food, clothing and shelter, but some of our neighbors are not so fortunate. It gives me pride to be associated with a club that uses its talents to help those who are less fortunate. Of course I am talking about the Empty Bowl Project. Thanks go to all you GTW members who donated bowls so that our contributions exceeded 325 bowls which helped raise thousands of dollars to be used to feed hungry people in our community. We challenge both the Dallas and Fort Worth clubs to beat our record next year! But, let's not stop at that. Next year let's see if we can beat our own record and make over 350!

The other nonprofit we contribute to as a club is the Beads of Courage Project. Beads of Courage is a program to provide a bead for each medical procedure that a very sick child must undergo. After many procedures, the child will have a necklace which they can use to help them tell their story. Our job is to make boxes that the kids can use to store their beads. I am behind on the number of Beads of Courage boxes I planned to make this year, but I hope to get a couple more made before the end of the year. In fact, I am excited about using my new Jamieson hollowing system that I purchased at SWAT to help with my Beads of Courage box making.

Don't forget about the upcoming exhibition "Turning Logs into Art" featuring turnings by GTW members. The exhibition will take place in the Visual Arts Center June 15-August 10. But don't wait until May to start thinking about what to make! Turnings need to be completed by the April meeting in order to be considered for inclusion. This is a wonderful opportunity for us to show the community what is possible with just a lathe and a log – well maybe a few turning tools and perhaps some enhancements using stain, dye, paint, burning, or piercing. I hope no one feels that his or her turnings aren't good enough. We can use a variety of different styles and something simple is often just as interesting as something more complicated.

Although all the details are yet to be worked out, we have to provide a list of the turnings that we are including in the exhibition by May 4. Between our April meeting and May 4<sup>th</sup>, an Exhibition Committee will compile the list of turnings to be included. If there are too many submitted turnings, the committee will referee the works and pick the pieces to be included. One of the goals of the committee will be to include at least one turning from everyone who submits something. There is no limit of how many pieces each person can submit. We are looking for three to five people to serve on the Exhibition Committee. If you are interested, please contact me or any other Executive Committee Member.

The end of the year is approaching and John Beasley is busy trying to get demos lined up for next year. If there a type of turning, a turning related technique, or a specific turned object that you would like to see demonstrated, let John know so he can attempt to get demonstrations that you want to see. He already has some lined up for the beginning of the year but he still needs more ideas.

The last thing I wanted to mention is that we are looking for a newsletter editor. Glynn has done a great job the last three years putting it all together. I greatly enjoy reading the newsletter and I hope someone volunteers for this task which is very important to the club. If you are interested, please contact me or any Executive Committee Member. If you think you might be interested, but you want more information before volunteering, talk to Glynn. Even if you are an engineer, like Glynn, and more used to working with numbers than words, please consider helping your club with this important task.


#### Tom's Notes:






### **Christmas Party**


### **Empty Bowls**
