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This Month's Demo is... "Turning Christmas Ornaments

With Icicles" Presented by Glynn Cox

My name is Glynn Cox. I was born in Shreveport, Louisiana and raised in Albuquerque, New Mexico. I attended the University of New Mexico majoring in Electrical Engineering and graduated from the University of Texas at Arlington in Mechanical Engineering.

I retired 7 years ago from a 37 year career with Bell Helicopter where I was in charge of Customizing Engineering. In my job I traveled to 34 foreign countries working with customers on their custom configurations.

I have always been a "hands on" type of person and was tutored from an early age by my dad in the art of fixing and building everything. I have not deviated from that as I not only enjoy woodturning but also "flat wood work", metal work, antique restoration and electronics.

Now about the demo.

After seeing a demonstration last year by Robert Rosan on turning Christmas ornaments I decided to give it a try. I turned several for family and friends who thought they were great and have "ordered" several more for this Christmas season. I have incorporated a few of my own ideas along with some gleaned from a finial class with Cindy Drosda. I will attempt to demonstrate turning hollow thin wall globes with very long decorative "icicles". I say "attempt" because it is quite easy to cut through the side of the globes or break the thin icicle. Hopefully that will not happen during the demo though I am sure the audience would enjoy an Uh-Oh or two.

I will discuss materials, proportions, tools, turning and finishing techniques.





President's Patter

Is turning wood an art or a craft? According to Wikipedia, "Art is the product or process of deliberately arranging items (often with symbolic significance) in a way that influences and affects one or more of the senses, emotions, and intellect," while a craft is defined as "a branch of a profession that requires some particular kind of skilled work." Certainly turing wood requres particular skills that we all strive to develop and improve, so it is definitely a craft. On the other hand, who has not been affected by a nicely turned piece by seeing, touching it, or even smelling the wood. (Come to think of it, I was emotionally affected once after turnig a piece of mesquite when I heard it being eaten by a bug somewhere inside it!) Anyway, what we do has aspects that make it a craft as well as aspects that make it an art.

When I turn a piece, I usually think of craft more than art, but often during Show and Tell I see a piece that I think of as art. This summer we will have the opportunity to show off to the community some of our best pieces that lean toward art. The Greater Denton Arts Council approved the exhibition "Turning Logs to Art" which will feature the work of our club members. The exhibition goes from June 15 through August 10 and it will be held in the Gough gallery of the Visual Arts Center.

The Gough gallery is not a large gallery, so the number of pieces to be on display will be limited. Even so, I hope that everyone in the club has at least one piece included. I will ask the Executive Committee to devolop a plan to judge submitted pieces to determine which we can include. If you have ideas about the process or criteria used, please let me or another Executive Committee member know. What you need to know at this point is is that by May 4, we will submit to the GDAC information on all the pieces that will be in the exhibition. This means that you will need to have all the pieces you wish to submit completed sometime before May 4, probably by April 2, so the pieces to be included can be determined. It is not too soon to start thinking about what you wish to submit. You will receive more details later.

Although it still doesn't feel much like Christmas, it is not too early to think about what you plan to turn for gifts. One nice Christmas gift is a tree ornament and we will have the opportunity to learn the art (or is it craft) of making ornaments from our own Glynn Cox. Glynn is giving the October demo. If you remember Glynn's ornaments from last year's Christmas party, you know that Glynn is an expert at making Christmas ornaments. I am looking forward to picking up some good tips from his demo.

Don't forget to bring bowls for the Empty Bowl Project. We are near our goal of 325 bowls, but we still have about 50 to go and we have less than a month to do it. We need everyone's help! Even if we don't get quite 325 bowls, we have to get a little over 300 to beat the Dallas club's record. Recall that the Empty Bowl Project raises money for the local food pantry and soup kitchen by providing a lunch plus a hand made (wood or ceramic) empty bowl to community members for \$20. This year the event will be held on October 22 at Saint Andrew Presbyterian Church.

As a last thought, I ask that each of you keep Bob Larson and Harold Gomez in your thoughts and prayers. Bob's wife passed away a couple weeks ago. Harold had been in the hospital or rehab for the last six months and he recently moved to the Denton senior care facility. He has had a rough time and still has a long way to go before he is back in front of a lathe. He would appreciate visitors.






Celebrate Roanoke Festival


