Douglas Fisher

Douglas J Fisher is a full-time artist living on Vancouver Island, Canada. Since 1992 he has been involved almost exclusively in creating some form of art, including painting, stained glass, photography, pen and ink drawing, and woodturning. Wood sculptures, primarily made using a lathe, have been the focus of his work since 1997. When not in his studio, Douglas can often be seen performing in theatre productions.

Prior to becoming a full-time artist, he taught skiing and sailing, was an ironworker, a driller and blaster in several underground gold mines, and delivered sailboats in the Pacific Northwest, the Caribbean, and across the Atlantic Ocean.

Some sculptures involve the use of indigenous iconography from the area where Douglas lives. "I have long been fascinated with the art of indigenous cultures from around the world. Upon first inspection it seems so simple and yet at the same time is very powerful. I hope to understand these cultures in my quest to explore a personal aesthetic."

Creating thought provoking and inspiring works of art by combining artistic vision with superb craftsmanship is something Douglas has been doing for some time. He exhibits his unique style of wood turned sculptures internationally, is sought after as a demonstrator and teacher and his works are in private collections around the world.

This months demonstration will involve: Surface Enhancement: In this demonstration you will learn all the methods Douglas uses to achieve the look of his pieces. This will include applying the design, rotary carving, burning, and coloring.

Join us for the 27th international symposium, to be held at the Tampa Convention Center, Tampa FL, June 28-30, 2013



The symposium directly reaches 1500 attending members each year on average. From our by-laws, "The Association's purpose is to foster a wider understanding and appreciation of lathe-turning ... This will be accomplished by providing education, information, organization, technical assistance, and publications relating to woodturning." We use a host of methods to pursue this goal. There are the gallery and offices in Saint Paul, our six-times-per-year Journal and AAW FUNdamentals e-letter, our annual symposium, our Educational Opportunity Grant program, 350+ chapters with their programs, and more. With all of these in use, the Journal and the symposium reach the largest measurable audience.

We can all play a part as we strive to increase the "understanding and appreciation of lathe-turning" of members through education. You can volunteer for a club demo and educate 30 to 100 of your fellow woodturners. Many of us do this and will continue to do so. A few, rarely as many as needed, contribute to their local chapter newsletter. This is greatly appreciated, always needed, and certainly valuable. Would you like to have an even larger impact?

Our Journal, in print or via the website, reaches our 14,000 members. Have you ever submitted something to the Journal? It doesn't need to be a multi-page article. It could be a tip. There are members in the same category as yourself who are interested in learning about what you know or have experienced along your woodturning journey.

Another way to reach a larger audience is to demonstrate at our annual symposium. The usual symposium attendance is in the 1500- range not to mention the walk-in visitors we'll get from the host city. It takes a wide range of topics and demonstrators to educate and entertain our attendees with something that caters to their particular interest or satisfies their curiosity. We strive to include all types of demonstrators from international to local and from pro to up-and-comer. Think of the reach you could have by demonstrating at the symposium-- not only the audience in your demo room but the attendees' chapters and other turning friends when those people return home and share. The educational process never stops. Share with one or a few and they will share. Share with hundreds during the symposium and think how that can multiply the effect in many widely scattered geographic regions. Have you ever applied to be a demonstrator? Why not? You certainly have something to share. Are the odds long on being selected? Perhaps. There are thousands of talented woodturners in the potential demonstrator-applicant pool and the number selected is quite small by comparison. Like the lottery, the odds are long but they are a lot longer without a ticket. You probably won't be selected if you don't apply.

Don't ever stop demonstrating for your local chapter or contributing to the website and newsletter. But, please consider sharing that same or similar material with a worldwide audience to really magnify the impact. Submit, apply, educate. Be part of the process!

Greater Denton Arts Council

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Did you know that the Golden Triangle Woodturners is a member of GDAC? What is that? GDAC is the Greater Denton Arts Council. They provide our meeting space, any administrative assistance that we need, and the exhibit hall and set up for our recent *Turning Logs Into Art*.

GDAC was founded in the 1970's to be the umbrella organization for the arts in Denton. During the 1980's a capital campaign was organized to renovate two facilities. One was for the visual arts and the other was to be for the performing arts. Only enough was raised to renovate one facility. This is our home, the Center for the Visual Arts. During the 1990's there was another capital campaign and the Campus Theatre was renovated into the performing arts facility.

GDAC provides grant funds to many of the art organizations in Denton. They do this by raising money through The Arts Guild which was formed in1980 to serve as a supportive arm of GDAC and to raise funds for GDAC and its member organizations. The Arts Guild holds an annual *Auction for the Arts* in November of each year. Since the first auction \$1,350,831.00 has been raised to support the arts.

Many people viewed our recent exhibit *Turning Logs Into Art*. There were many comments about the wonderful work of our members. Next year we plan to discuss with GDAC the possibilities of an arts outreach program where we could demonstrate and possibly give woodturning lessons.

How about helping to further the arts in Denton by donating a work for the November *Auction for the Arts?* Donation forms for the auction will be available at our September and October meetings. Or, become an individual member of GDAC, only \$35 for an Arts/ Educator membership or \$50 for an individual membership.
