Back to the Basics - Bowl Turning

During 2013 we plan to do a series of Hands-On demonstrations where we will go **Back to the Basics**. Our plan is to have four lathes set up, demonstrate a cut and then have club members try that cut to get a better understanding for it. There will be a coach at each lathe for assistance and safety.

The January demonstration will be our first **Back to the Basics** hands on program. It will cover making a basic bowl. We will include forming a tenon, roughing the outside, shear cutting to prepare for sanding, and turning the inside.

If you are interested in trying these cuts we ask that you bring a bowl gouge of your choice along with safety equipment of a face shield, or at minimum, a pair of safety glasses. If you don't own a bowl gouge there will be some available for you to use. We will also have a sharpening station should your gouge not be as sharp as you would like.

This will be our first attempt at a *Back to the Basics* hands on demonstration. Your feedback on this is important. Please let us know what you thought of it and what you would like to see or try in the future.

For those more experienced members we would ask that you be available to assist members and further discuss the cuts and variations as you deem necessary.

President's Report

During our December Board Meeting we took extra time to discuss the club's purpose, how we were doing, and what we might do to improve.

We described the purpose of our club in terms of our goals as follows:

- 1. Provide education through demonstrations, show and tell, open shops, and mentoring.
- 2. Provide a social aspect that promotes camaraderie among members and opportunity to make new friends.
- 3. Promote participation so that members can more fully enjoy being part of the club.
- 4. Participate in our community through public service by supporting Empty Bowls and Beads of Courage.
- 5. Create community awareness by turning cars at the Arts and Jazz Festival and Roanoke Days and organizing exhibits of our work.

There was a general feeling that we were pretty much on track and had good plans for the coming year.

We then did some brainstorming to come up with ideas that may improve our club and listed them for possible implementation.

Ideas for 2013

- 1. Safety, more emphasis, consider a quarterly 5 10 minute presentation
- 2. Open shop try to make them a follow-up to the demonstration
- 3. Show and tell, have members come forward and talk about the item rather than staying seated
- 4. New member package to inform about the clubs activities as well as having someone assigned to introduce new members and answer questions.
- 5. GTW postcard that would be sent as a thank you note to demonstrators, etc.
- 6. Back to Basics Hands on Demonstration, 3 or 4 a year to help beginners and tune up the rest of us while teaching good technique with lots of participation.
- 7. Turning in the Park, acquire a generator so we could set up in the park and do demonstrations for the general public.
- 8. Duck Boxes for Beads of Courage, a club project where members get together to make boxes and ducks for the kids.
- 9. Team Speed Turning Tournament, organize an annual event where teams from the metroplex clubs compete to see who can make the most good bowls for Empty Bowls in an allotted time period.
- 10. Kids Turning an outreach program to teach youth the basics of turning.
- 11. Quarterly turning challenge, reinstate.

Lots of good, good ideas! So, what do we do next?

First, we are going to implement the obvious and easy ones. At the January meeting we will change the format for show and tell, initiate a quarterly challenge – turn a platter, and have our first *Back to Basics* hands on demonstration.

Third, we will ask for your feedback on the other ideas as well as additional ideas you may have, discuss them, and implement them if appropriate.

AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF WOODTURNERS A MESSAGE FROM PHIL MCDONALD

Just as I was about pen a few remarks, I happened to glance at a report of the most recent study on "Volunteering and Civic Life in America" taken from the 2011 census data. Minnesota, the home of the AAW, ranks 4th among all states in the percentage of our residents who volunteer. Seventyone percent of us do favors for our neighbors, and 89 percent make time to




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eat together as families. The total economic value of our contributed volunteer service tops \$3.8 billion. As a Minnesota native, all of this comes as no surprise. And while the majority of AAW members reside elsewhere, I have a sense that most of you will find these numbers to be very familiar as well.

There was a brief period back in October when it just happened that I had several conversations with chapter members who proudly told of projects their clubs had undertaken to support charitable causes, including raising money for cancer research, supporting our wounded veterans, and youth education. I spoke with a Minnesota member who helped organize the trips to Ukraine in 2007 and 2008 to give orphaned children a chance to turn with the hope of inspiring them to them to acquire a marketable skill for their futures. And the AAW was just putting finishing touches on the video portion of a soon-to-be-completed grant project that will offer new resources to enable, and to encourage, woodturners who are dealing with sight impairments to keep turning.

This is the essence of what the AAW is all about. You are part of the preeminent nonprofit educational association dedicated to supporting everything good about woodturning, and woodturners. And I think that too often the latter of these is overlooked. Our culture of volunteerism and giving to others, still strong after nearly 27 years, remains intrinsically woven throughout the national organization, our chapters, and you, our members.
