I quickly made a jig to accommodate the wheels and low and behold it worked like a champ. I can press on wheels really fast now and it only takes a minute to put on all 4. Another idea is if you turn a 2 step dowel you can do the same with your drill press. Insert the smaller diameter into the drill chuck and then press down on the wheel and car. A Calculus Project

What is better than combining your job with your hobby? I teach math at the University of North Texas. This year I am teaching a yearlong calculus class filled with talented high school students who are enrolled in the Texas Academy of Mathematics and Science. I am always looking for ways I can apply mathematics to wood turning and recently I had an idea that not only accomplished that, but it will also raised well over \$600 toward a scholarship fund.

Support spindles were used to spin yarn before the spinning wheel was invented. In fact, there is evidence that spindles date back 20,000 or more years. Even today, there are many people who spin on spindles as a hobby. For the last year and a half, I have been making and selling support spindles. To date, I have made approximately 600 and sold them in most of the 50 states as well as 9 different countries.

Based on feedback I realized that most spinners prefer spindles in the weight range of 25 to 40 grams. But the physics of a spinning object


indicate that it is not just the weight that is important, but it is how the weight is distributed. The mass and its distribution are summarized in a measurement called the moment of inertia. The moment of inertia of a small object rotating around in a circular path is its mass times the radius squared. For a solid, the moment of inertia is computed by thinking of breaking up the solid into many very small pieces and adding up the mass times the radius squared over all the pieces. Most people seem to prefer the moment of inertia in the range of 20 to 35 g cm².

So, I had the idea of asking my calculus students to design Tibetan style spindles with the moment of inertia approximately 30 g cm². Tibetan spindles are characterized as having a thin shaft and a much wider whorl that carries most of the moment of inertia. Students worked in groups and each group designed one spindle. They used calculus to determine a whorl shape that has the proper moment of inertia. You can read the project assignment at http://www.math.unt.edu/~brand/CLASS/1710/2012Fall/SpinProj.pdf. I thought students would enjoy seeing their spindles in finished form so I made the seven spindles pictured below. I did not want to make 31 spindles and I didn't know how to give spindles to only seven of the 31 students, so I decided to sell them and contribute the money to a scholarship fund at UNT. I put them on ebay and let all my customers know they are there. My students enjoyed watching the bids come in. To date, I have sold five for a total price of just under \$500. I am expecting that after the other two are listed and sold to have a total of over \$600 to contribute to a math scholarship fund.






NEAL BRAND'S STUDENTS WITH SPINDLES








GTW Issues a Quarterly Challenge

TURN A 9 TO 11 INCH PLATTER IN THE FIRST QUARTER 2013

There's Only One Month Left!

It has been a while since Golden Triangle has had any sort of turning challenge. If you read John Beasley's president report you noticed that one of the goals for this year was to establish a quarterly turning challenge. So for the first quarter the challenge will be to turn a platter with the target size of 9 to 11 inches. We were able to find turning blanks that are 9 to 10" that we will supply for anyone interested in using them. It is not mandatory that the challenge platter be turned from supplied blanks, you are more than welcome to use a blank of your choosing that fits within the suggested target range. The challenge is open to all turners independent of skill level. If you only have a mini lathe, make a platter to the smaller target. Use this as an opportunity to work on your style, form, and finish.

Bring your completed platters to the April meeting and show them off. We will set aside time at the meeting to critique each turning.



Don't wait until the last minute. We are in the last month of the challenge. We would like as many platters as possible at the April meeting.



SuperNova2 or G3 chuck. Just buy one of these chucks and you will already have the spindle adapter required for this lathe.

- 1x8 Chuck adapter for Oneway live center

This odd little piece of metal Oneway sells for \$35. It is threaded onto a chuck then onto Oneway's revolving center (not included) mounted in the tailstock. This makes centering a piece on a vacuum chuck (not included) or to a Doughnut chuck (included) very easy. Once mounted, the chuck is removed from the piece and the tailstock. Then you finish turn the bottom of your piece.

-Doughnut chuck base with 4 different sized ring plates

This must have jig is used for clamping pieces so you can finish turn the bottom. A few of the ring plates

are lined with leather so not to damage the piece as you clamp down on the sides. You make more or

modify these ring plates as needed to safely secure pieces of different sizes.

- **Steady Rest/Bowl steady** with 4 wheels custom fit to 1442 lathe bed

This is a must have jig for turning large bowls and hollowforms/vases providing lateral support for the

piece while pressure is applied during turning. I used a woodworking clamp under the lathe bed to secure it. I never got around to it but you can add a screw plate easily enough.

With the lathe and these last 2 jigs, you are set for turning practically anything....just add your tools and get a chuck.
