### **Richard Rivera**

I have been working in wood for as long as I can remember. I have been turning wood for about seven years, I have been turning pottery for about twelve years and I have been a pediatrician in the north Carrollton are for the past thirty three years. Some people have said that I put a little of my pottery background in my wood turning. We are



always looking for ways to enhance the work we do by coloration or burning, carving or piercing, engraving or inlaying. I, like others have glued up different species or colors of wood to accent or try to beautify our turnings in some way. The "Celtic Knot" is just one technique to achieve this enhancement. I started by cutting all the way through the stock and re-gluing back together, but since these cuts are made at different angles to them selves, we are trying to clamp in two or more planes, which can really be challenging. I stared thinking, why cut in two, why not partial kerfs to inlay the contrasting wood. I have since seen and or read about this some where, but I do not recall, so I certainly did not "invent" this technique. I hope to share my one way of accomplishing a decorative embellishment to add to our arsenal of techniques to apply to our turning.



## President's Platter

Back when I had to work for a living, December and January was the time when plans were firmed up for the next year and final numbers came in for the prior year. Were sales and profits up as planned, did we hit the production numbers, how was safety, were major capital projects completed or on schedule? Year end reports had to be written in preparation for the next Board Meeting. At the same time there needed to be a big push to get everything up and running after the holidays. I always made time to do a detailed walk through of all the facilities to make sure the plant and shops were in good order starting the year as well as to see that the support groups were up to speed.

I clearly remember performing these tasks because I have to laugh at myself for what I did these last two months as a woodturner now going into my sixth year of retirement.

In the woodturning kit are index cards recording the number of signable turnings, 140 in 2013 compared to 117 in 2012, a strong increase considering 7 were stools with multiple turnings per unit. I didn't hurt myself and I feel the quality of my work improved. There was a minimum of capital expenditures with the exception of miscellaneous didn't need tools. The walls around the lathe have been painted covering up years of green wood spatter and chip hits. Storage areas have been straightened out and tools and equipment are tuned up. The inventory of turning blanks has been culled of the ones that cracked during drying. Left are 27 spalted maple, 25 ash and 36 various kiln dried with 16 sycamore and 5 sweet gum drying inside and 13 catalpa logs up to 30" in diameter in the yard that should net 50 plus turnings.

I guess I am stuck with an annual ritual ingrained over many years in business. Last then, is to firm up plans for 2014 which is easy. I'm going to have fun turning. But before I get up to speed in the shop, its time for a nap!

#### Free 3D Design Tool for Woodworking

I became aware of SketchUp a couple of years ago. I must have slept for a couple of years because apparently SketchUp has been around since 2005!

So what is SketchUp? SketchUp is a graphic design program. It allows anyone to do CAD (computer-aided design) with great precision. One can use the program like a sketch pad to visualize an object in two dimensions. For the adventurous, the program allows construction of objects in full three dimensions.

Why would I want to use a design program like SketchUp? Well as I mentioned, you might want to use it to visualize and design something that you would want to build in your shop. You may want to use it to replicate an intricate decorative pattern or even a hole pattern as an aid to manufacturing. You could use it to do a scale layout of your work shop or your home. Also I have run across a couple of designs for wood project that are presented in a SketchUp format. Downloading the design in SketchUp format gives the user the capability to make changes or to make a more personalized version.

The great thing about SketchUp is that it is a free download. SketchUp is available at <a href="http://Sketchup.com">http://Sketchup.com</a>. The free version is called SketchUp Make. The professional version is also available as a working trial version.



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


Sketchup in designing the Shape of the bowl


