Dr Sara Robinson



I'm a professor of wood anatomy at Oregon State University. I'm also an artist. My interests lay in wood aesthetics and the concept of parergonal aesthetics. I like pretty colors and aggressive sports – and I play a lot of roller derby.

Artist Statement

I work within the field of art science as a bio artist. Unlike many artists who utilize scientific techniques to develop their art, I strive to maintain a balance of both fields in my work. I strive to not be 'just' an artist or 'just' a scientist, but to blur

the line between the two disciplines. Neither science nor art can exist without the other, and it is important to communicate that to viewers.

My current work involves the development of colored pigments on wood by mold fungi. As molds are some of the most reviled fungi in the world, their use in functional art is controversial and challenges our core assumptions on toxicity, functionality, and understanding of the natural world.

I primarily utilize fungi in my work, often with wood as a medium. Two intertwining processes drive me – a return to natural ornamentation techniques and the promotion of parergonal aesthetics. Wood, as a traditionally functional material, holds a unique place within human emotions. The use of fungi and natural decay processes not only creates ornament (instead of dyes and stains), but challenges perceptions of functionality. Decay fungi are generally disdained, but wood is held in high regard. The meeting of both can create emotional conflict and challenges the

viewer to reevaluate their position on functional wood and natural ornamentation processes.

We hope you will enjoy our demonstration and if you have not already done so we hope you will give making a natural edge bowl a try.

Note: This meeting will be historic as we will be doing this live over the internet. Dr Robinson will be doing this live but in the state of Oregon. We are looking forward to this event.

Lastly I want to leave you with final thoughts on safety from woodturner Steve Blenk

"Just remember: them tools is always hungry, and they'd rather eat you than wood. You gotta outthink 'em all the time"

Tip # 1 The wood lathe is a reasonably safe tool and it's fun to use...but it will bite you if you're not carefully.

Tip # 2 Anything that can wrap up in the lathe will do so sooner or later.

Tip # 3 Look everything over before you spin it.

Tip # 4 An off balance piece can jump out of the chuck and pay a call on your nose.

Tip # 5 Irregular pieces are more dangerous, and deserve respect.

Tip # 6 Sanding on a lathe can hurt you; don't take it likely

Tip # 7 See that your turning tools stay sharp

Tip # 8 Be extra careful when trying new techniques on the lathe

Tip # 9 Wear an impact visor

Tip # 10 Even better, wear a visor with a built-in respirator

SWAT 2015

Register before August 1st and save 20-25% over the onsite registration.

Registration is now open for SWAT 2015 with two convenient ways to register, either online or by mail.

We have tried to make it as easy as possible for you to register this year, online using Pay Pal or with the old snail mail. Either way gets you in the door for the second biggest Turning Symposium in the world. Our goal is to give you the best demonstrators, vendors, Instant Art Gallery and learning experience for your buck, and still include lunch every day in a relaxed informal atmosphere. Where else could you find:

- 54 turning classes (Rotations as we call them)
- · electronically delivered Handbook
- great lunch
- the biggest Instant Art Gallery of all the symposiums
- Special Interest Groups (SIG)
- more (Tool, Art and Wood) door prizes
- 3 lathe give away
- over 45 vendors in 80+ booths
- along with Internationally known turners such as Jimmy Clewes (Wood World of TX), Stewart Batty (Woodworkers Emporium), Molly Winton (Wood World of TX)... demonstrating in the vendor area all for \$140

We have also added the sale of Door Prize Tickets (Formerly Raffle Tickets) to our registration forms to make it easy for you to order more tickets ahead of time. You will be able to pick them up at the Registration Window and add them to the bin when you arrive. We will also have people roaming the floor selling tickets all during SWAT and at the Banquet. Because of State regulations on non-profit organizations holding raffles we have reclassified these as door prizes.

This year we will not be printing the Demonstrator Handbook. Instead we will be delivering it by email to everyone around August 1st to give you the chance to:

- 1. Look through and decide what Rotations you would like to attend.
- 2. Print out a portion or the entire Handbook to take with you to the Symposium.
- 3. Transfer it to your laptop, tablet or phone to take with you.
- 4. Formulate and write down any questions you have for the demonstrator a head of time.

This also allows for printing and viewing in color, something we have previously been unable to afford. You can also bind it the way you prefer, spiral, 3 ring binder, staple... etc. For those who do not have an email we will have printed copies at registration. We will also have a few for sale at the window for \$3 while they last.

Early registration ends August 1st after which you will need to register onsite for a 20-25% higher registration fee.

Safety Reminder

The lathe can be a very safe tool if you are attentive mainly because, unlike most other power woodworking tools, the lathe does not have a moving cutting blade. Rather, the wood moves and you can control its speed. However, you can get some nasty injuries in the form of contusions (bruises), jammed fingers and other things if you are not careful. The following checklist of woodturning safety precautions should be followed to ensure that you minimize your chance for injury.

- Always check the lathe speed before turning it on. If in doubt start at a low speed and work
 up until you are comfortable and the lathe does not vibrate or walk across the room.
- Be sure your tools are sharp. The first thing you tend to do when the tool is not cutting well
 is to push harder, and that is when you make a mistake.
- When you turn the lathe on for the first time with a new piece of wood on it, be sure that
 you are not in the fly path.
- Once mounted, turn the blank by hand at least two revolutions to be sure that it does not hit anything. Repeat this process every time you adjust the tool/hand rest.
- Be sure a faceplate is screwed on all the way before turning the lathe on. Otherwise, it will screw itself on very, very, very tight.
- Be sure that the blank is securely mounted and that a faceplate is flush on the stock.
- Retighten the tailstock often, especially during the roughing process.
- Adjust the tool/hand rest often during roughing.
- Rub the bevel.
- Always use the tailstock when possible even on faceplate work secured by screws. The roughing process can loosen screws.
- Use eye and/or face protection.
- Use dust protection when sanding.
- Be sure that you are not allergic to woods (especially some exotics) before you work with them a lot.
- Do not wear loose clothing.
- Use good lighting.
- Ensure that you have no distractions, especially sudden ones like your spouse yelling at you.
- Turn the lathe off when you walk away from it.
- Stop the lathe and check everything out if something does not seem right to you strange sounds, vibration, wobble, smell etc.
- Sand in the lower quadrant near you so that sandpaper is "pulled away" from you. Sanding
 on the opposite side of the piece subjects your fingers to being jammed.


